Native Plant Garden Set to Start at Vandergriff Park

ACC has chance to help with
first phase of new wildscape

We have another opportunity to assist our Parks Department and spread the word about the virtues of native plants. On Saturday, April 24, from 9:00 am until noon or so, we are invited to plant the first bed of what will become a large and highly visible wildscape in Vandergriff Park, Arlington's second most-used park.

At a recent meeting with Gordon Robertson, Park Planning Manager; Joe Pack, Park Planner; and Jay Falgout, Park District Supervisor, ACC board members discussed plans for the new demonstration garden, which will be phased in on the site of a former playground. Molly Hollar has agreed to work on the design for the garden and the Parks people have pledged significant support in terms of soil preparation and transport and placement of a number of large rocks.

Back on February 28, Molly Hollar did one of her favorite things. She talked about one of her favorite places, though in a bit more formal circumstance than she is used to. She was invited to speak on the Molly Hollar

Wildscape during the Native Plant Spring Symposium held at the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center in Austin. Not to pass up an opportunity to promote it, she gave a 10-minute presentation as part of the Ecological Gardening session. She was a real pro, staying cool even as she had to put up with initial problems with the PA system. Molly was in good company, participating in a panel with Rosa Finsley and David Mahler. Rosa, the Wildscape's landscape architect, remarked to the audience that the Wildscape project was different from a lot of others she has been approached about. Those, she said, would ask for

her help but in reality they wanted her to do the work. In contrast, the Wildscape volunteers, inspired so well by Molly, have been there working from the beginning.

At one of our recent board meetings Marianne Herrmann called for ACC's taking an active role in the battle to improve our air quality. Of course, she is right; we have high concentrations of

What's In Bloom

Behind a magic bench at the Wildscape stand coralberry bushes wearing neon green, and in front of it a mass of Texas gold

columbines—yellow long-spurred flowers that seem poised for take off from scalloped-edged foliage. Look for this bench as you stroll freshly mulched trails. Finding it will be your prize!

Blackfoot daisies brighten the overlook area. The coral honeysuckle at the double kiosk is weighed down by a profusion of its own trumpet-shaped flowers. Not far are clumps of pink Gregg's salvia and a solitary clump of white ones too. Golden groundsel blooms stand tall near the pavilion.

March Workday and Plant Propagation

At the March 6 workday, wildscape volunteers paired up with five youth from Tarrant County Juvenile Services led by Mike Warren. A number of Boy Scouts showed up and a Girl Scout leader worked with them. Trails were mulched and planting done. Anne Alderfer took pictures, including one of human mountain goats Kay Sekio, Pat Lovejoy, Ann Trenton, and Jean-Marie Smith planting coralberry on the slope below the overlook for erosion control.

Jean Hiler, Molly Hollar, and Glenn Troutman have made full use of the greenhouse at Randol Mill Park to propagate plants. Enter the greenhouse and behold healthy plants in all stages of development, many of which—especially the 4" pots—will be sold at the Native Plant Sale on May 1.

Native Plant Sale

Saturday, May 1: Native Plant Sale

Time: 9 am – 3 pm

Bring plenty of green (of the paper variety) to buy:

Organically grown native plants:

Perennials: black-eyed susan, columbine, four-nerve daisy, flame acanthus, gayfeather, lance-leaf coreopsis, Maximilian sunflower, mealy blue sage, Mexican butterfly weed, purple coneflower, salvia coccinea, Turk's cap and violet ruellia.

Ground Covers/Vines: Frog-fruit, golden groundsel, horse-herb, lyre-leaf sage, passion vine, snake-herb, violets and white avens.

Grasses: Gulf Coast muhly, Lindheimer's muhly and inland sea oats. Other grasses provided by Bluestem Nursery will be available.

Trees: Eastern red cedar and roughleaf dogwoods.

Butterfly garden starter kits:

Each kit will have a flat of twenty plants, a 1-gallon passionflower vine and Henry Turner's butterfly garden handout with care instructions.

Garden gloves and books on native Texas plants will be on sale. Native plant experts will offer free advice on just the right plants to suit your yard.

If you're not in the market for plants, come browse the information table for handouts on native plant and butterfly gardening. Or take a 15-minute guided tour of the Wildscape ending at the butterfly garden, and be sure to look for the magic bench.

All proceeds from the plant sale benefit the wildscape.

Native Plant Garden Set to Start at Vandergriff Park

Discussion focused on how to make a start without hurrying through the design. The entire area could include almost 9000 square feet and will require a number of design considerations that, everyone agreed, should not be rushed. In order to coordinate the project's start with Earth Week, we will begin working on a relatively small bed adjacent to the former playground. This bed will contain a kiosk that will be used to promote the project and future planting events.

After enjoying Mr McNeal's presentation the group adjourned to the home of Stan Parker and Taylor Stephens-Parker for a personal tour of their garden, refreshments, and networking.
